

# INDS 594: JESUS AT THE MOVIES

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May 9 – 20, 1:15 – 3:45 pm

2 or 3 graduate credit hours; or 2 audit hours

## COURSE DESCRIPTION

Jesus is an endlessly fascinating subject for artists, having inspired many of the greatest works of art throughout history. There has been an extraordinary range of cinematic portrayals of Jesus, including a growing number of non-western films. Join us as we study depictions of Jesus in film and examine the cinematic reimagining of centuries-old Christian images. Reflect on how the research of the last two hundred years into the gospels and life of Jesus can inform our appreciation of these “Jesus films.”

## LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the class are fourfold:

1. To develop a broad understanding of the way in which Jesus has been portrayed in the history of film.
2. To identify the major questions and issues related to the portrayal of Jesus in specific movies.
3. To bring these movies into conversation with an informed study of the New Testament and with key theological and Christological ideas.
4. To cultivate a nuanced and practical understanding of the richness of Jesus movies as both works of art and as theological statements.

## COURSE OUTLINE

After three introductory lectures surveying some of the major questions and issues related to the study of Jesus movies, the sessions will be devoted to specific films.

**Day 1** “Who do you say that I am?” A hundred years of cinematic responses to Jesus; Cecil B. DeMille, *The King of Kings* (1927) – 155 minutes (available on Youtube)

**Day 2** “In the cinema the eyes are everything”: Classical Christology and Franco Zeffirelli’s *Jesus of Nazareth* (1977)

**Day 3** Beyond the Passion: Wrestling with the Resurrection in Jesus Movies

**Day 4** Pier Paolo Pasolini, *The Gospel According to St. Matthew* (1964) – 136 minutes

**Day 5** Norman Jewison, *Jesus Christ Superstar* (1973) – 102 minutes

**Day 6** Terry Jones, *The Life of Brian* (1979) – 93 minutes

**Day 7** Martin Scorsese, *The Last Temptation of Christ* (1988) – 156 minutes

**Day 8** Denys Arcand, *Jesus of Montreal* (1989) – 115 minutes

**Day 9** Mel Gibson, *The Passion of the Christ* (2004) – 121 minutes

**Day 10** Mark Dornford-May, *Son of Man* (2007) – 91 minutes
