COURSE DESCRIPTION

Is there a divine purpose in my people's history? Can we discern God's action in a world of natural causes? Why has God allowed so much suffering? Such questions require both simple faith and complex reasoning. Learn to live out the answers by engaging with the political, scientific, and pastoral aspects of the doctrine of providence. Join us as we explore the vital history of Christian thought about how God preserves, accompanies, and governs the world he loves.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon the successful completion of this course, students should have a clearer understanding of:

- 1. a critical appreciation of key writings about divine providence
- 2. increased awareness of the political and scientific implications of theology
- 3. deeper empathy with those whose suffering challenges the notion of purpose
- 4. greater wisdom about how to speak of God's action (and when to remain silent)
