BIBL 588: THE BOOK OF PROVERBS DEVELOPING WISDOM IN A COMPLICATED WORLD

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course intends to instruct students how to read and interpret the book of Proverbs according to its original meaning as well as its continuing significance for faith and practice. This study involves not just the mastery of the content of the book, but a study of the principles of interpretation (hermeneutics) that grant access to the meaning of the book as well as the ability to bridge the horizons to our present situation. Proverbs' purpose is to make its readers wise on a practical, ethical, and theological level. But becoming wise involves more than just learning the content of the book of Proverbs, it includes being able to read people and culture. This course will help students appropriate the wisdom of the book in both its original setting as well as from a twenty-first century Christian perspective.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon the successful completion of this course, students should have a clearer understanding of:

- 1. Develop a better acquaintance of contents of the book of Proverbs.
- 2. Students will be able to apply appropriate interpretive approaches to the book of Proverbs to recover original meaning and subsequent significance of the biblical text (for church, Kingdom, and wider world), taking into account historical backgrounds and critical issues.
- 3. Students will grow acquainted with the ancient Near Eastern and Old Testament backgrounds to the book of Proverbs.
- 4. Students will grow familiar with the canonical place of the book of Proverbs, and in particular they will understand how this book presents Christ.
- 5. Students will learn to preach and/or teach the book of Proverbs, and they will know how to utilize it with integrity in pastoral counseling.
- 6. Students will learn the relationship between the three main wisdom books (Proverbs, Job, Ecclesiastes).
- 7. Students will understand the nature of wisdom in the Bible.
- 8. Students will learn how Proverbs contributes to the Bible's understanding of reward and punishment (retribution theology).
