COURSE DESCRIPTION

The church still has a long way to go in demonstrating the radical hospitality of God to all nations. In this deeply theological and relentlessly practical course Dr Kandiah explores further how the church must deal with its past and push on towards its future as the multicultural people of God. The church has a never-changing calling to demonstrate the love of God in word and deed. In recent years it has become increasingly apparent that we have both unwittingly and deliberately colluded with racism and xenophobia. In this hope-filled course Dr Kandiah presents biblical and practical ways that churches can bring change both in their congregations and communities.

- 2. Create sustainable practices for Christians to practice racial justice.
